



FAREWELL FORMER PRESIDENT DEBORAH FOX

HCC's 44th President of Highland Community College, Deborah Fox, retired June 30, 2024. Fox began her duties as president in July 2019 although she was no stranger to HCC having served as Vice President of Finance before returning in 2019.

In the 2019 fall semester, President Fox, her staff and the HCC Foundation Board reset the financial picture for the coming year, but were faced with an additional challenge in March 2020 with the COVID pandemic. Despite the difficulties posed by Covid, she, along with her faculty and staff, ensured the completion of the spring semester through zoom and online classes.

As the fall 2020 semester resumed, Fox took charge as the Covid coordinator, prioritizing the health of the student body with extensive testing, isolation measures and adjustments to the fall sports schedule by moving fall sports to the spring. The commitment to overcoming these challenges reflects her dedication to student success. Under Fox's leadership she successfully addressed the closing of the local laundry mat with overseeing the construction of an on campus facility benefitting the student body.

In 2022, along with the help and planning of the HCC Foundation, her focus shifted to the HCC Technical Center in Atchison with a new diesel technology building. In addition, the ventilation renovation project for the existing welding technology building was completed. Further contributing to the development of the College's infrastructure, a pole barn was built in August 2023 to house equipment for the precision agriculture program at the HCC Western Center in Baileyville. Throughout these projects, President Fox managed day to day college operations.

SCOTTIE FLASHBACK: Our longest serving president was David Reist who served as HCC president from 2001-2019. Prior to serving as our president, he served as Dean of Students, the Director of Financial Aid as well as teaching and coaching at HCC.



HCC EARNS THE PRESTIGIOUS 2024 KBOR DATA QUALITY AWARD

At the June Kansas Board of Regents (KBOR) 2024 Data Quality and Planning Conference, KBOR President and CEO, Dr. Blake Flanders, presented Data Quality Awards to Highland Community College and Wichita State University Technical College (Wichita Tech). Jeff Hurn, HCC Director of Institutional Research, was in attendance to receive the award.

"Winning the 2024 Data Quality Award from KBOR is a remarkable achievement for Highland Community College, and it is a team award earned by all of our hard-working employees who strive every day to collect, coordinate, communicate and submit good local, state and federal data on behalf of the many stakeholders we serve," remarked Hurn.

Now in its twelth year, the prestigious annual KBOR Data Quality Award serves to recognize institutions for excellence in the quality of data submitted and the timeliness of submissions. Awards are given each June to the two Kansas institutions with superior ratings, recognizing the outstanding team of professionals who provide institutional data to the Board. This year, each awardee scored the highest points of institutions from its sector, either for community colleges or for technical-only colleges.

KBOR stated, "Data is key for understanding the performance of today's higher education system, as well as the state's economy. Providing quality and meaningful data requires dedicated data teams. This year's awardees have distinguished themselves through exemplary effort and commitment to the highest data standards."

KBOR went on to say, "Strong data reporting is critical to our success in serving students, their parents, the Board of Regents, the Legislature and the Governor. The superior quality and accessibility of higher education data in Kansas is invaluable for data-driven decision-making, and only possible through a well-orchestrated effort by so many dedicated individuals."

Data is submitted to KBOR throughout the year to support a variety of purposes, including distribution formulas for state and federal funds, Board and legislative agendas, research initiatives, federal and state compliance, employment follow-up for graduates and consumer information such as the tools found on the Kansas Higher Education Statistics and the Kansas Degree Stats websites (stats.kansasregents.org and ksdegreestats.org). Data is also provided at the federal level to the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) which is state-certified through KBOR annually.

Highland Community College is proud to receive the Kansas Board of Regents Data Quality Award for 2024.

EARLY COLLEGE COST CHANGE

HCC's Board of Trustees approved a reduced tuition and fee rate of \$65 per credit hour for Kansas high school students. This new rate is a significant cost savings compared to the previous \$147 per credit hour, making higher education more accessible across the state.

According to Sara Smith, Assistant Dean of Instruction of Early College (formerly known as concurrent), the aim of the new rate is to expand access to early college opportunities, particularly transferable general education courses. Doniphan County high school students continue to benefit from free tuition and fees. The Early College program at HCC serves over 1500 students and approximately 50 high schools each semester through online, face-to-face, technical and concurrent offerings.

SCOTTIE FLASHBACK: The tuition at Highland University in 1870 was \$12 per term or \$36 per year. (We operated on trimesters.) Room and board was between \$3 and \$3.50 per week. It was possible for a student to attend Highland University for about \$150 per year. This may not seem expensive compared to costs today, but it prevented many students from attending for financial reasons.

TECHNICAL CENTER ACHIEVES 100% NCLEX-PN PASS RATE FOR SECOND CONSECUTIVE YEAR

For the second year in a row, Highland Community College Technical Center's Practical Nursing students have achieved a remarkable 100% first-time pass rate on the NCLEX-PN assessment for licensure as Licensed Practical Nurses (LPNs).

As of December 2023, the national pass rate for first-time test takers on the NCLEX-PN, as reported by the National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN), is just over 86%. This makes HCCTC's achievement even more impressive and a testament to the quality of our nursing program.

Anna Fowler, HCCTC Director of Nursing, commented, "This is the second class to take the NCLEX-PN with the NextGen (NGN) style of questions. The NGN was developed in response to research indicating that nearly one-fourth of medical errors involve newly licensed nurses in their first year of practice. The NGN-style questions are designed to assess clinical judgment and critical thinking skills, which are essential for safe and effective nursing practice."

In the United States, aspiring nurses must pass the NCLEX examination to become licensed. The NCLEX-PN is designed for those who have earned a certificate in practical nursing, while the NCLEX-RN is for those with an associate or bachelor's degree in nursing. Both exams evaluate nursing knowledge and the ability to make sound clinical decisions, manage complex processes and handle challenging situations that nurses will encounter in their careers.

The demand for practical nurses is on the rise. According to O-Net Online, employment opportunities for LPNs are projected to grow by 6% between 2020 and 2030. Similarly, the Bureau of Labor Statistics projects that the registered nursing workforce will increase by 6% over the next decade, growing from 3.1 million in 2021 to 3.3 million in 2031. This growth includes an anticipated 203,200 job openings for RNs each year through 2031, driven by retirements and other workforce exits.

TEN YEARS OF WESTERN CENTER

The HCC Western Center celebrated its tenth year of operation with graduation May 10.

The HCC Western Center, located in Baileyville, opened its doors in the summer of 2014, offering general education classes and Certified Nursing Aide classes. The technical program classes that began in August were Diesel Technology, Medical Assistant and Welding Technology. Allied Health classes, such as CNA and Certified Medication Aide, were also offered. After the first year, they had one graduate from the Welding Technology program.

"Highland Community College was diligent about surveying the surrounding communities to determine their needs and which technical programs were first to launch at the Center," reflected Cara Baker, HCC Western Center Director.

Initially, the Western Center served nine public high schools for technical training during the day also offering general education classes throughout the day and in the evening. (With the closure of Wetmore High School in 2023, they now serve eight high schools.) They also serve quite a few students from various home school entities. Annually, the Western Center typically enrolls 125-150 students.

In 2015, Construction Technology was added to the Center's offerings, followed by Precision Agriculture in 2016. By May 2018, the Western Center's commencement ceremony was moved to Baileyville. The most recent program addition was Early Childhood, introduced in 2022. The Western Center continues to offer Allied Health and general education classes in addition to technical programs. This past May, the Western Center had 40 candidates for graduation.

Former HCC President David Reist was this year's Western Center commencement speaker. He was integral in acquiring the former B&B school building and completing renovations to fit technical program training needs in this part of the HCC service area. At the time of acquisition, HCC was awarded a grant to help cover the cost of the startup of the facility, developing Allied Health offerings and the Precision Agriculture program.

Not only has the Western Center continued to provide a place for educational training opportunities for students, it has been a place for career opportunities for local residents. As of May 2023, five of the seven original faculty and staff members who were hired were still working at the Western Center. As of this May, there were still four of the original employees at the Center. Most of the employee changes were due to retirements.

"The Western Center team is committed to its longterm success. Providing this type of resource to the



area is a mission we all believe in," said Baker.

PRECISION AGRICULTURE ADDED AT TECHNICAL CENTER

This fall, Highland Community College Technical Center in Atchison will open its doors to their first group of students enrolled in Precision Agriculture classes.

Students enrolled in the Precision Agriculture program learn content such as GPS soil sampling, remote sensing technology, computer-based application and variable rate technology. Students completing a certificate or degree in Precision Agriculture will be well-equipped to navigate the demands of modern farming on their own farm operations or obtain positions such as Precision Ag Technicians at implement dealers, Crop Specialists, Nutrient Management Specialists, Precision Ag Department Managers, Precision Agronomists or Precision Farming Coordinators.

Jacob Chalfant was hired as the first Precision Agriculture instructor at HCCTC. He grew up in northeast Kansas working around row crop and cattle operations. After graduating from Kansas State with a degree in Ag Education, he took a job locally as a high school ag teacher where he's been for the last three-years. He and his wife also run a cow-calf operation with their two dogs, Doc and Fritz.

"When I'm not teaching, judging or checking cows, you'll find me outside enjoying nature. I'm excited to join the faculty at Highland and look forward to teaching Precision Agriculture this fall," stated Chalfant.

Precision Agriculture classes have been taught at HCC since the fall of 2016. Students enrolled in Precision Ag

Scott Kohl, HCC Director of Viticulture and Enology, reflected, "It was a perfect day! Great weather, great food, excellent music and wonderful wines. We couldn't have asked for a better event. We can't wait until 2025!"

A total of 468 tickets were sold both online and at the gate, providing attendees with a variety of wine and food samples. Participants also had the opportunity to purchase unopened bottles of wine and various food items to enjoy at home. The festival featured live music on two stages and additional food options from the Jammin' Jamaican food truck.

Event participants enjoyed ideal weather conditions with clear skies, 80-degrees and a light breeze. Attendees praised the event and expressed enthusiasm for next year's festival. Both winery representatives and food vendors appreciated their inclusion and expressed interest in returning in 2025.

It has been a year since I was honored by being named athletic director at Highland Community College, and I sincerely appreciate all of the friendships and support that has been shown toward me and all of our athletic programs.

The 2023-24 school year was memorable for Scottie athletics, headlined by the Scottie football team finishing the season ranked #15 in the final national poll and a third-place finish in the always tough KJCCC. It was the highest final ranking in school history. We saw the return of volleyball after a canceled season in 2022. Both HCC basketball programs advanced to the semi-finals of the Region VI tournament in March and Scottie track and field produced many memories including four men's and two women's new school records being set.

In the classroom, HCC athletics produced nine First-Team, 11 Second-Team and 14 Third-Team National Junior College Athletic Association Academic All-Americans. FOOTBALL RANKED 15TH IN COUNTRY

The Highland Scottie football team finished the 2023 season with a record of 6-5. The Scotties were ranked #15 in the nation in the final NJCAA Football Poll. This is the first time in school history the program has finished the season ranked in the top 15. A total of 13 Scotties earned All-Conference honors, including four First-Team selections. Off the field, Scottie football earned the highest recorded team GPA in school history. This included 38 young men who earned a GPA of 3.0 or higher.

HEIMAN SELECTED AS FINALIST FOR NACE STUDENT LEADERSHIP AWARD

The National Association of Collegiate Esports (NACE) sent the following in a letter to HCC's esports head coach, Matt Ludwick.

"We are thrilled to inform you that Carter Heiman has been selected as a finalist for the prestigious NACE Awards! Carter's outstanding achievements and contributions have not gone unnoticed, and we are honored to recognize him as a finalist for the Student Leadership Award."

Out of 18,000 student athletes who compete in NACE, Heiman is one of 15 finalists. Five winners will be chosen.

"I am extremely proud of Carter," Ludwick stated. "He has always exceeded my expectations while doing his best in school. He has been elected captain of over seven teams including one of which they earned a conference championship. I cannot think of anyone who deserves this recognition more than him."

WOMENS SOCCER IS BACK

After some time without soccer, the college is excited to bring the women's soccer program back. The goal is to build a program of high athletic and academic standing. The team will look to find success in a competitive

conference as they rebuild the foundation of the program. This group of players coming in are motivated and excited to be a part of the return of the program to Scottie Nation. We look forward to having everyone come out and support the team this fall!

O'FARRELL PLACES 8TH AT NJCAA NATIONAL MEET

Alexis O'Farrell (Appleton City, Missouri) placed eighth at the NJCAA Division I national meet in javelin in May, earning the title of All-American.

"I want to thank my teammates for being so supportive during the season and my coaches for being there for the hard times throughout the years. I can't wait to see what God has planned for me in the next few years," said O'Farrell.

Leading up to the national meet in Monroe, Louisiana, O'Farrel's best throw was 38.12 meters. She surpassed her previous personal best by throwing 42 meters making her the eighth best javelin thrower in the NJCAA in 2024.

"Alexis is an extremely hard worker who is willing to put the time in to improve. I am so proud of her," said Matt Ludwick, HCC assistant track coach.

Next year, O'Farrell will join the track team at Southwest Baptist University in Bolivar, Missouri to continue her college education majoring in graphic design with a minor in computer science.



1974 SCOTTIE FLASHBACKS



WALTER YOST: Walter Yost was named "Teacher of the Year" in the 1974 yearbook. Mr. Yost grew up southwest of Atchison. He taught at Atchison High School for 21-years before coming to HCJC in 1964. He also taught at KU, Benedictine, the Federal Penitentiary and Peru State. He illustrated 50 science books and painted 28, 8 by 12 foot murals at KU. While there has never been a question of his talent, it was said that people admired him most because of the respect he gave his students and pushed them to give their best.

NEW DORM: Ellis Hall was dedicated August 18, 1974. After its dedication and ribbon cutting, visitors toured the new dorm before heading to Scottie's Pause for refreshments. No county tax money was used to pay for the building of Ellis Hall. The residence hall was named in honor of J. Harley and Grace Ellis, former residents of Highland who had willed the college 16- acres of land in western Kansas. This land was sold and the money was used to pay part of the costs of the new dormitory.

Ellis Hall still stands today and houses students. Many parents have encouraged students to choose Ellis because of its proximity to the Library, Cafeteria and classrooms.



MOM JOHNSON: Mrs. Laura Johnson was known to most students attending Highland Community Junior College in 1974 as Mom Johnson. Mom came to HCJC in 1954 and started the Student Union in Irvin Hall. One room in the Union was called the "Rainbow Room" because five different colors of paint were donated so each wall and the ceiling had a color all its own. Mom showed much patience and love and always seemed to have time to listen and talk to the students. She never refused her friendship to anyone. Those who knew her called her a stone foundation of the school.

50-YEARS OF VOLLEYBALL: This year, we're celebrating 50-years of volleyball at HCC. HCJC competed in volleyball for the first time the fall of 1974 under the leadership of Coach Glenna Batchelder. The team went 5-3 in their first season in the Greater Kansas City Community College Conference.



GOLDEN GRADS: The HCJC class of 1974 has marked 50-years since their graduation in Highland. This year, they will be celebrated as our Golden Grads at Homecoming Saturday, Oct. 12. We invite the class of 1974 back for a reunion, lunch and the football game.

Tony Woodrum was the president of HCJC in 1974. That year, HCJC employed 23 full-time faculty and administration. The enrollment that fall was 291 students.
