Course Description:

This course will introduce the field of animal science. The course will focus on fundamental concepts of genetics, animal breeding, physiology, anatomy, nutrition, digestion, and the scope of the livestock industry.

Course Competencies:

Upon completion of the course, the student should be able to:

- 1. Describe the role animal agriculture plays in individual lives.
- 2. Explain how animal agriculture affects quality of life.
- 3. Explain how the sciences of genetics, nutrition, physiology, and economics are used in developing management strategies for animal agricultural enterprises.
- 4. Analyze animal welfare issues and evaluate their impact on farming practices.
- 5. Analyze food safety issues in the animal agriculture industry.
