

AB 123 – Spring Apiary Management Prerequisite: None 2 Credit Hours (Lecture)

Department:

Course Description:

This course is designed to provide an introduction to the basics of spring apiary management. The course will cover preparing colonies for spring honey production, promoting colony health, and increasing the number of colonies.

Course Competencies:

Upon completion of the course, the student should be able to:

- 1. Prepare and maintain the hive in suitable condition
- 2. Demonstrate the methods used to prevent robber bees
- 3. Verify a laying queen by identifying the various stages of brood production
- 4. Explain the use of the queen marking system
- 5. Explain the reasons for and method of re-queening a colony
- 6. Demonstrate the methods of feeding and medicating a colony
- 7. Explain the reasons for switching, splitting, and repositioning colonies
- 8. Demonstrate the placement of equipment for different types of honey products
- 9. Explain reasons for swarming and the methods of swarm prevention

Course Content:

- A. Early spring management
 - 1. Clean the bottom board
 - 2. Repair any deficient equipment
 - 3. Prevent robbing
 - 4. Check for laying queen
 - 5. Marking queens
 - 6. Re-queening and queen rearing
 - 7. Feeding
 - 8. Medicating the colony
- B. Mid-spring management
 - 1. Remove entrance reducers
 - 2. Examine brood
 - 3. Exchanging brood
 - 4. Switching colonies
 - 5. Splitting colonies
 - 6. Reversing brood chamber
- C. Late spring management
 - Producing extracted honey

Guidelines for Requesting Accommodations Based on Documented Disability or Medical Condition
