Course Description:

This advanced course will cover various techniques involved in the formulation, preparation, and construction of animal nutrient rations.

Course Competencies:

Upon completion of the course, the student should be able to:

- 1. Formulate rations using the Pearson Square method.
- 2. Formulate rations using simple algebraic equations.
- 3. Appraise feeds for livestock on criteria of TDN, kcal, proteins, amino acids, minerals, vitamins, etc., on both as-fed basis and nutrient composition figures.
- 4. Prepare rations on a least-cost basis.
- 5. Balance rations for beef cattle, dairy cattle, sheep, swine, and horses.
- 6. Explain the use and meaning of the Uniform State and Federal Feed Bill.
- 7. Prepare supplement formulations for feed additives to various livestock rations using computer templates for batch and individual ration formulation.

 - 2. X + Y = 100 method
 - 3. Ration exercises over parts A and B in text

 - 2. Balancing rations-vitamin considerations
- D. Feed Tag Laws
- E. Feed Additives
- F. Evaluating Livestock Premixes
