Course Description:

The attractiveness of a home is often determined by the quality of its finish. Care needs to be taken in selecting the materials to finish the interior of the home. This courses describes the various materials used for insulating the home, finishing the walls and ceilings, and cabinetry.

Course Competencies:

Upon completion of the course, the student should be able to:

- 1. Thermal and Moisture Protection
 - a. Describe the requirement for insulation.
 - b. Describe the characteristics of various types of insulation materials.
 - c. Calculate the required amounts of insulation for a structure.
 - d. Install selected insulation materials.
 - e. Describe the requirements for moisture control and ventilation.
 - f. Install selected vapor barriers.
 - g. Describe various methods of waterproofing.
 - h. Describe air infiltration control requirement.
 - i. Install selected building wraps.
 - j. Identify various properties of cement.
- 2. Interior Wall and Ceiling Finish
 - a. State the difference between the six levels of finish established by industry standards.
 - b. Identify the hand tools used in drywall finishing.
 - c. Identify the materials used in drywall finishing.
 - d. Properly finish drywall using hand tools.
 - e. Identify various types of problems that occur in drywall finishes.
 - f. Patch damaged drywall.
 - g. Apply painted finishes.
 - h. Apply lacquers and varnishes.
- 3. Finish Flooring
 - a. Identify various types of floor finishes including sizes and grades.
 - b. Determine the number of board feet of strip flooring needed to cover a given area.
 - c. Install resilient tile.
 - d. Identify various types of self-adhering tiles.
 - e. Install ceramic tile.
- 4. Cabinetmaking
 - a. Identify parts of manufactured cabinet.
 - b. Identify woods and materials used in cabinet construction.
 - c. Identify hardware used in constructing cabinets.
 - d. Install cabinets.

Course Content:

- C. Finish Flooring
- D. Cabinetmaking

Learning Assessments:

Competencies will be assessed by assignments, case problems, quizzes, chapter tests, hands-on projects, lab assignments, a midterm test, and a final test. The test can be in the objective format or in a problem solving format.
